**Short course description:**

One of the main types of alternative dispute resolution (adr) is mediation which has a long tradition in countries such as the US. However, the use of this form of adr at the international level has grown rapidly only in recent years , and the rules applicable to international mediation have developed quite differently than in the US. The aim of the course is to examine the mediation procedure, with emphasis on regulation in the European Union. **Short course description:**

Economic integration has been and remains a central aspect of the European Union. To offer its citizens an area of freedom, security and justice without internal frontiers. The establishment of the internal market was set out as one of the Union's important objectives. The concept of internal market is defined as an area without internal frontiers characterized by the free movement of goods, persons, services and capital ensured in accordance with the provisions of the EU Treaties. In this context, this course examines the law regulating the internal market of the European Union covering the four freedoms (goods, persons, establishment and services and capital) as well as competition law. The final part of the course covers means of redress and access to justice. The project of completion of the internal market by the end of 1992 is analyzed from the perspective of its historical, political and economic background. The subsequent policy and regulatory initiatives aimed at accomplishment of the internal market's freedoms are discussed.
