

POLISH PREPARATORY SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM OF STUDY

Two-Month Polish Summer School (200 hours)

The eight-week course of Polish for international students offers classes at all levels of proficiency from CEFR A0 to C1 level. Students are placed in groups aligned with the level of their language proficiency. There are 25 hours of instruction each week.

The course aims to improve all aspects of language competency, including speaking, listening, comprehension, grammar, reading and writing. It focuses on equipping students with language skills necessary for analysis and comprehension of academic texts and for critical assessment of complex theories and terms. Students also have an opportunity to learn about some aspects of Polish culture, such as film, history, literature, art and music.

During the course, students will watch and discuss some contemporary Polish films. Additionally, they will visit some places of interest in Warsaw, including The National Museum, Zachęta – National Gallery of Art, the Royal Castle, the Warsaw Uprising Museum, the Royal Łazienki Museum and Park, the Museum of King Jan III's Palace in Wilanów, and POLIN - the Museum of the History of Polish Jews. They will also watch and discuss some contemporary Polish films.

The eight-week course provides students with more time to further develop their language competencies and become more fluent in Polish. They will have an opportunity to focus more on their speaking, listening and writing skills and will become more familiar with the realities of daily life in Poland

One-Month Polish Summer School (100 hours)
